Minimum Allocation Grants




- HB 632: \$150 million of State ARPA funds.
 - Distributed to incorporated cities/towns and counties based on BARSAA tax percentage
- Use Requirements both Federal ARPA and HB 632.
- Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (LFRF) are different! MAG can't be used for General Government Services under Revenue Replacement like LFRF.

Applications accepted until January 1, 2023; funds must be obligated by end of 2024, spent by end of 2026



Eligible Projects, Wastewater



- Centralized wastewater treatment
- Energy and water conservation
- Stormwater projects with water quality benefit
- Agricultural best management practices
- Decentralized wastewater treatment
- Resource extraction of contaminated sites
- Landfills
- Habitat protection and restoration
- Groundwater protection and restoration
- Surface water protection and restoration
- Planning/Assessment (PERs and CIPs)




Eligible Projects, New Categories



- <u>Stormwater</u>: Culvert repair, resizing, and replacement of storm sewers. No longer requires a direct water quality benefit but must be part of a stormwater management system.
- <u>Private Residential Wells</u>: Testing initiatives and treatment/remediation strategies that address contamination. *No longer required to be a public water system.*
- <u>Lead in Schools</u>: Replacement of internal plumbing and faucets and fixtures in schools and childcare facilities.
- Growth: Reasonable growth anticipated at time project is initiated.



Match example Town XYZ:

Total project cost = \$100,000, Minimum Allocation = \$88,000, LFRF = \$114,000

Method 1: 50% of \$100,000 = \$50,000 Method 2: 25% of \$114,000 = \$28,500 \$28,500 is the minimum required match.

Grant request will be \$100,000 - \$28,500 = \$71,500 Remaining MAG = \$88,000 - \$71,500 = \$16,500







Match, Sources

- Other loans: SRF, USDA-RD
- Other grants: MCEP, CDBG, RRGL
- Other ARPA funds: LFRC, Competitive, Tribal
- Local Funds: Utility maintenance funds
- In-kind services: Labor or design work
- Match expenses can be incurred prior to March of 2021 but must be directly related to the project.



Operating as a "pass through"

Because counties do not often own/operate water and wastewater systems, they will operate as pass throughs for School Districts, Water/Water and Sewer Districts and Unincorporated Towns

Being a "pass through" is not a passive act. At a minimum, it requires:

- 1. You to apply for MAG on behalf of the Water/Water and Sewer District or Unincorporated Town
 - This includes providing the necessary match for the grant if necessary (if not provided by the District/other entity, ideally from Local Fiscal Recovery Funds
 - Application can cover direct costs (including administration of the grant) and should include the cost of an audit
- 2. Executing MOUs as necessary
- 3. Ensuring that procurement complies with state and federal requirements
- 4. Administer grants including requesting reimbursements, etc.*
- 5. Comply/ensure compliance with state and federal reporting requirements

*administrative costs can be included in grant request/budget

Reporting



- Minimum Allocation Grant funding is federal—the state of Montana is required to report performance and accomplishments funded through this program to ensure efficient and effective distribution of ARPA funds.
- At a minimum, local governments receiving MAG funding should expect to submit performance reports describing:
 - The status of the project;
 - Accomplishment of project goals and objectives;
 - Any problems or obstacles encountered; and
- Financial reports providing:
 - An overview of the project's financial status;
 - Total expenditures;
 - Any program income earned; and
 - Match provided

DNRC may add additional reporting requirements to meet Montana's reporting obligations.






Making a Minimum Allocation Grant (MAG) Plan


A local government may invite proposals from eligible water and sewer districts and associations for ARPA Minimum Allocation Grant funding.

Projects can then be prioritized according to needs, with public input.
